Ghost's story

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The VHS's annual auction returns!

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Advocates decry racehorse deaths



In December 2022, the VHS conducted a poll among residents in the Lower Mainland to determine their consumption habits and attitudes around plant-based eating. The data was used to develop a cost-benefit analysis and subsequent report on the impact an individual could make by shifting 25%, 50%, and 100% of their diet towards plant-based foods.

The analysis compared the typical price and greenhouse gas emissions of each animal-based products with a common plant-based alternative of the same serving size.

The report found that if an individual shifted even just 25% of the animal-based foods in their diet to plant-based foods, they could save up to \$13 a month or \$156 a year. An individual making a full shift to plant-based could save \$50 a month or \$600 a year.

Just a 25% transition to plant-based alternatives could save an individual up to 17kg of carbon dioxide equivalent (CO2e) per month, which is equivalent to charging a cellphone up to 2,068 times, or 204kg of CO2e per year. A 50% transition can save someone up to 33kg of CONTINUED ON P. 2

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CO2e per month. This equates to 396kg of CO2e per year, which is about the distance of driving from Vancouver to Regina in a gaspowered vehicle. Swapping 100% of one's diet to plantbased alternatives could save 68kg of CO2e a month or 816kg of CO2e a year - the same as the emissions used to power an entire home for six months.

In terms of cost savings, individuals could make the most impact by shifting all of the beef they eat to lentils. Swapping all beef to lentils could save an individual up to \$60 a month up to a maximum of \$720 per year. For an individual eating the average Lower Mainland diet, swapping only 25% of beef for lentils would result in nearly double the emissions savings compared to swapping 100% of ten monthly servings of pork, chicken, and fish. Using the same number of servings,

reducing beef by just 35% has the same impact as cutting out all chicken and pork from one's diet.

The report highlights that even gradual steps in shifting one's diet can make a significant impact on greenhouse gas emissions and individual grocery bills.

Based on Statistics Canada consumption data, it is likely that millions of animal lives could be saved with even small changes in the diets of B.C. residents.

Try it at home: Vegan blueberry French toast (no eggs or dairy!)

INGREDIENTS:

Toast:

- 1 ripe banana
- 2 cups plant-based milk
- 1/2 cup cashews, soaked and drained
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 tsp allspice (or cinnamon)
- pinch salt
- 1 1/2 tsp cornstarch
- 1 loaf day-old multigrain bread

Optional ingredients for serving:

- blueberries or other fruit
- maple syrup
- coconut whipped cream

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 200 F.

In a blender combine all ingredients, except bread. Blend until very smooth and creamy. Pour the mixture into a pie plate or casserole dish for dipping.

Slice bread into thick slices. Heat a non-stick pan over medium medium-high heat. Using tongs, dip each piece of bread in the batter, coating both sides evenly. Place the bread on the hot pan and cook for a few minutes until golden brown. Flip and cook on the other side.

Place cooked slices into the oven to keep warm until all the slices are ready. Serve immediately with fresh blueberries (or other fruit), maple syrup and coconut whipped cream if desired!

Opposition to factory farming and federal 'ag-gag' bill continues to grow

A concerning 'ag-gag' bill that would criminalize whistleblowers and undercover investigators who expose animal cruelty or welfare issues on farms has been sent to the House of Commons agriculture committee for further review this fall. This comes after more than 2,100 VHS supporters called on their Member of Parliament (MP) to oppose Bill C-275.


Meanwhile, the Union of BC Indian Chiefs (UBCIC) unanimously passed a resolution opposing factory farming and calling for provincial and federal government action. The resolution notes that "animals on factory farms are one of the most unregulated and unprotected groups of animals in BC and Canada, and their mistreatment during raising, transport and unethical slaughtering practices is a punishable act under the Criminal Code, but the lack of

regulation and oversight bodies prevents it from occurring."

This illustrates why more transparency and accountability is needed when it comes to Canada's animal agriculture sector, not less. 'Ag-gag' legislation in other jurisdictions has been used to limit transparency and prevent undercover exposes that shed a negative light on this hidden industry.

The VHS and other leading animal protection organizations across Canada are continuing to urge federal decision-makers to vote against Bill C-275. The VHS has launched an updated campaign, which includes a quick action tool that Canadians can use to send a message to their MP, the federal Minister of Agriculture, and the House of Commons Agriculture Committee. VHS releases new footage from B.C. Rodeos and speaks out about Calgary Stampede horse death



The VHS's campaign to end inhumane rodeo events continues after a busy summer of monitoring and documenting rodeos across B.C. and speaking out about the Calgary Stampede rodeo and chuckwagon races.

Newly released footage taken from several B.C. rodeos shows stressed and agitated animals being roughly handled and deliberately agitated into fleeing and bucking, including animals being hit and having their tails, hair and ears pulled. Animals are also seen thrashing around in the chutes and being put at risk of serious injury.

This year's Calgary Stampede resulted in the death of a chuckwagon horse, bringing the total animal fatalities at the Stampede to 105 since the VHS started tracking deaths in 1986. The VHS also raised concerns about the treatment of animals during the Stampede rodeo and continues to support local advocates who are opposed to these controversial events.

Inhumane horse racing leads to deaths, VHS speaks out

The VHS recently spoke out on the inhumane and dangerous use of animals for entertainment at Vancouver's Hastings Racecourse after four horses lost their lives in just three weeks this summer.

Two horses were euthanized after sustaining injuries during races; another horse suffered a heart attack during a training session; and another fell backward prior to a race.


The VHS pointed to the inherent welfare risks associated with horse racing,

including the stressful, highspeed nature of the events, the painful tools used to control horses' movements such as whips and bits, and the risk of horses being sent to auction after they retire, typically around four to six years of age.

A VHS spokesperson shared these concerns and called for the public not to attend inhumane racing events in interviews with media outlets including City News Vancouver, Victoria News, and The Aldergrove Star.
